Daphne's achievement was all the more remarkable, coming 16 years after the foundation of the NHS, and the arrival of the Windrush.

Born in 1929, in the Essequibo region of Guyana, Daphne was the eldest of nine children. From an early age she wanted to pursue a career in the medical profession, inspired by her father who worked as a qualified pharmacist.

'A woman of courage with a heart of gold' – the words her sister, Carmen Munroe, used to describe Daphne Steele.





Daphne Steele was one of the many people from the Caribbean who dedicated their lives to the National Health Service and, on 16th October 2018, a blue plaque was unveiled in her honour. Daphne became the first Black matron in the NHS, when she successfully applied for that role in 1964 at St.Winifred's hospital in Ilkley, Yorkshire.
