Our year 9 GCSE dancers have also been working on developing their technique and performance skills in lesson. They had the opportunity to demonstrate these new skills during the Remembrance assembly. For some of them this was the first time they had performed to an audience! They are a hardworking and resilient group, and did a great job of coming up with some of the choreography. piece, she was left alone and vulnerable on the stage with her phone pinging. The presentation of work by Studio79 has led me to the conclusion that anyone who wishes to

pursue Musical Theatre or Dance training as a post-16 option should consider theis course.

An important part of careers education, information and guidance (CEIAG) at AVS is about helping students to be aware of local LMI.

**What is LMI?** - Labour Market Information (LMI) is a useful tool to help research future jobs in the local area, understand the skills needed for certain roles and the demand for future employment. LMI helps to break down the complex 'world of work', ranging from descriptions of different careers, their entry routes, promotional prospects, salaries paid, skills and qualifications needed, etc. Crucially for young people, LMI also covers future demand – what kinds of jobs will be in demand after leaving school and what kinds of skills will be needed.

Why is LMI so important to young people? - The world of working is changing rapidly. New technology and industry changes create some new jobs and also make others obsolete. Alongside the ongoing Covid-19 pandemic changing the way jobs are carried out and having a huge impact on the job market, it can be hard to keep up. It's important that young people are given the tools and information to aid their decisions about future careers and LMI is a key part of this.

How can LMI help young people decide what to do next? - Having up to date, high quality information can help students decide things about their future such as:

- Are there opportunities close to where I live in the sector I am interested in or will I need to relocate?
- How competitive is the industry I am interested in? Are there enough jobs and do I need to have a back up plan?
- Does the pay for the job I want align to what I would like to earn?
- What is the best route for me to take to get to the job I would like?
- Is the industry I would like to work in growing or shrinking?

**Year 11** - Year 11 have been very busy this month, visiting post 16 destinations and making applications. I will continue to post updates for open evenings and key deadlines in the Google Classroom

**Year 10** - I cannot yet say with certainty that work experience 2022 will take place for all students as local employers continue to deal with the demands COVID places on them. However, we are still preparing students for this event planned for July. All students should now have handed in their parental permission forms and letters to employers to Mrs Jones.

Mrs Jones will begin approaching employers in the New Year.

**Year 7 and 8** – will begin their careers lesson in PSHE in January. They have already had a careers insight talk from Damian McAuley, an agronomist with Indigro. He spoke virtually to students from the fields in Leicestershire that he was studying. Students had many questions from him ranging from what is his salary, does his work involve foreign travel and had he watched 'Clarkson's Farm'! An Agronomist was not a job anyone had heard of before. We all learnt that an agronomist is someone who is an expert in the science of soil management and crop production.

## **Success for AVS Gymnast**

Two students have recently won medals at a gymnastics event held in Newcastle.

Year 9 students, Lina Tounsi and Daniella Hurwood, who both train and compete for Rugby Gymnastics Club, travelled north to Newcastle upon Tyne for their first competitive gymnastics competition since before the first lockdown.

Lina, who has been involved in gymnastics since she was 4 years old, won a gold medal after coming first on the vault, third on floor and being placed first overall. Her classmate Daniella, who's taken gym classes since she was 2 years old, came third on the bars and vault and was placed third overall.

The duo spend a lot of time training and attend the gymnastics club five times per week, with sessions lasting four hours. After their success in Newcastle the pair, who one day hope to compete at the Olympic Games, have qualified for British Gymnastics' National One Competition which will be held in Cannock in the New Year.

Alison Davies, Headteacher, said, "It's always great to hear about our students' successes, whether they are in or out of school. I am very impressed to hear about Lina and Daniella's success, both are wonderful students, who always work hard at school and obviously apply the same level of focus when training and competing in gymnastics. ### Leave of Absence

The Supreme Court recently reached a decision in the case of Platt v Isle of Wight Council which has clarified the law on unauthorised leave, including holidays, during term time. The parents of children of compulsory school age are required to ensure that they attend school on a regular basis. The Supreme Court has made clear that attending school 'regularly' means that the children must attend school on every day that they are required to do so. As such, the parents of any child who is absent from school without authorisation for any length of time are likely to be considered as committing an offence under s444 of the Education Act 1996.

Head Teachers retain the ability to authorise leave in accordance with the Education (Pupil Registration) (England) Regulations 2006. When considering such requests for a leave of absence, the school are obliged to act within the law. Head Teachers may not grant any leave of absence during term time unless there are exceptional circumstances relating to the application. If the leave is granted, head teachers are able to determine the number of school days a child can be absent for.

It is for the Head Teacher to decide what is 'exceptional' and it is at their discretion if the circumstances warrant the leave to be granted. The school can only consider Leave of Absence requests which are made by the 'resident' parent.

Each application for a leave of absence will be considered on a case by case basis and on its own merits.

Where applications for leave of absence are made in advance and refused, the child will be required to be in school on the dates set out in the application. If the child is absent during that period, it will be recorded as an unauthorised absence, which may result in legal action being taken against the parent (s), by way of a Fixed Penalty Notice.

Failure to make an application for leave in advance can also result in a Fixed Penalty Notice being issued to the parent(s).

All matters of unauthorised absence relating to a Leave of Absence will be referred to the Warwickshire Attendance Service, part of Warwickshire County Council

It is important to note, Fixed Penalty Notices are issued to <u>each parent of each absent child</u>, (for example 2 children and 2 parents, means <u>each</u> parent will receive 2 invoices in the amount of £120 each, totalling £240 for both children, this is reduced to £60 per child if paid within 21 days).

Where a Fixed Penalty Notice is not paid within the required timeframe as set out on the notice, the matter will be referred to Warwickshire County Council's Legal Services to consider instigating criminal proceedings under S444 Education Act 1996.

Fixed Penalty Notices are issued in accordance with Warwickshire County Council's Code of Conduct for Penalty Notices.
