



### Message from the Head

Dear Parent/Carer,

As we come to the end of the first term of the academic year, I would like to thank you for the support that you have shown to the school over the last four months. In particular, I thank you for your donations to our many charity events - for poppy day, the food bank and most recently Christmas jumper day. I know that in these difficult times many of you will be finding it harder than usual to help out and I really appreciate you encouraging your children to get involved; working in partnership with us to teach them that helping others in need is the right thing to do. I have been pleased to see that, post covid, much of our school life has now returned to normal.

Attendance is improving and many more trips and visits are now taking place. It has been a real pleasure to be able to host our house Christmas lunches for the first time in three years and it has been lovely to see the students enjoying themselves with their peers. ## Leave of Absence

The decision in the case of Platt v Isle of Wight period, it will be recorded as an unauthorised Council which has clarified the law on absence, which may result in legal action being unauthorised leave, including holidays, during taken against the parent(s), by way of a Fixed term time. The parents of children of Penalty Notice. compulsory school age are required to ensure that they attend school on a regular basis. The Supreme Court has made clear that attending school 'regularly' means that the children must attend school on every day that they are required to do so. As such, the parents of any child who is absent from school without authorisation for any length of time are likely to be considered as committing an offence under It is important to note, Fixed Penalty s444 of the Education Act 1996.

Head Teachers retain the ability to authorise leave in accordance with the Education (Pupil parents, means each parent will receive 2 Registration) (England) Regulations 2006. When considering such requests for a leave of absence, the school are obliged to act within the law. Head Teachers may not grant any Where a Fixed Penalty Notice is not paid within leave of absence during term time unless there are exceptional circumstances relating to the application. If the leave is granted, head teachers are able to determine the number of school days a child can be absent for.

It is for the Head Teacher to decide what is Fixed 'exceptional' and it is at their discretion if the circumstances warrant the leave to be granted. The school can only consider Leave of Absence requests which are made by the 'resident' parent.

Each application for a leave of absence will be considered on a case by case basis and on its own merits.

Where applications for leave of absence are made in advance and refused, the child will be required to be in school on the dates set out in

Supreme Court recently reached a the application. If the child is absent during that

Failure to make an application for leave in advance can also result in a Fixed Penalty Notice being issued to the parent(s).

All matters of unauthorised absence relating to a Leave of Absence will be referred to the Warwickshire Attendance Service, part of Warwickshire County Council

Notices are issued to each parent of each absent child, (for example 2 children and 2 invoices in the amount of £120 each, totalling £240 for both children, this is reduced to £60 per child if paid within 21 days).

the required timeframe as set out on the notice, the matter will be referred to Warwickshire County Council's Legal Services to consider instigating criminal proceedings under S444 Education Act 1996.

Penalty **Notices** issued are in accordance with Warwickshire County Council's Code of Conduct for Penalty Notices.

Keep Safe

### This Christmas



With snow and ice affecting the UK, The Royal Life Saving Society UK are urging the public to be aware of the dangers these freezing conditions can pose.

Many aren't aware of the dangers of frozen water; it may look solid from the surface but will not hold your weight and could crack when stood on. The Royal Life Saving Society UK has devised these safety tips about the dangers of frozen waters.

When water is frozen and the cold weather sets in these are a few safety tips to take note of:

- Teach children not to go on to frozen lakes, ponds, canals and reservoirs under any circumstances. Children and pets are particularly at risk when tempted to play on the ice formed on open water during cold weather.
- Pets should be kept on leads when near frozen water and owners should refrain from throwing objects onto ice for them to retrieve.
- Bystanders should shout reassurance to casualties without endangering themselves. Make sure help is on the way by phoning the emergency services (call 999 or 112).
- Do not walk or climb onto the ice to attempt a rescue and certainly don't get into the water, you may become the next casualty.
- If someone can't climb out of the water, it is not advisable, as many people think, to move about in the water to keep warm while waiting for help. Instead they should conserve their energy by keeping as still as possible.
