


































### **Students On-Stage at the RSC**

Once again at Avon Valley, staff have been supporting Norma Wilson, a Placement Support Worker, in collecting items for Christmas hampers for care leavers in Warwickshire.

Norma has been putting together hundreds of festive hampers for over 20 years. She creates the hampers for the Warwickshire Fostering Service to go to young people and asylum seekers who have recently left foster care and now live alone without family support.



For young people without families, Christmas can be a lonely and difficult time and



many do not receive any gifts at all. As well as Christmas gifts, the hampers also contain essentials such as socks, gloves, mince pies, biscuits, soups, toothbrushes, and anything else that might be of use.















### **Leave of Absence**

The Supreme Court recently reached a decision in the case of Platt v Isle of Wight Council which has clarified the law on unauthorised leave, including holidays, during term time. The parents of children of compulsory school age are required to ensure that they attend school on a regular basis. The Supreme Court has made clear that attending school 'regularly' means that the children must attend school on every day that they are required to do so. As such, the parents of any child who is absent from school without authorisation for any length of time are likely to be considered as committing an offence under s444 of the Education Act 1996.

Head Teachers retain the ability to authorise leave in accordance with the Education (Pupil Registration) (England) Regulations 2006. When considering such requests for a leave of absence, the school are obliged to act within the law. Head Teachers may not grant any leave of absence during term time unless there are exceptional circumstances relating to the application. If the leave is granted, head teachers are able to determine the number of school days a child can be absent for.

It is for the head teacher to decide what is 'exceptional' and it is at their discretion if the circumstances warrant the leave to be granted. The school can only consider Leave of Absence requests which are made by the 'resident' parent.

Each application for a leave of absence will be considered on a case by case basis and on its own merits.

Where applications for leave of absence are made in advance and refused, the child will be required to be in school on the dates set out in the application. If the child is absent during that period, it will be recorded as an unauthorised absence, which may result in legal action being taken against the parent(s), by way of a Fixed Penalty Notice.

Failure to make an application for leave in advance can also result in a Fixed Penalty Notice being issued to the parent(s).

All matters of unauthorised absence relating to a Leave of Absence will be referred to the Warwickshire Attendance Service, part of Warwickshire County Council

It is important to note, Fixed Penalty Notices are issued to <u>each parent of each absent child</u>, (for example 2 children and 2 parents, means <u>each</u> parent will receive 2 invoices in the amount of £120 each, totalling £240 for both children, this is reduced to £60 per child if paid within 21 days).

Where a Fixed Penalty Notice is not paid within the required timeframe as set out on the notice, the matter will be referred to Warwickshire County Council's Legal Services to consider instigating criminal proceedings under S444 Education Act 1996.

Fixed Penalty Notices are issued in accordance with Warwickshire County Council's Code of Conduct for Penalty Notices.

# Measles and the Measles, Mumps and Rubella (MMR) vaccine

There has been an <u>increase in measles</u> cases across the West Midlands including recent cases in Birmingham, Coventry, and Solihull. Before we reach the end of the school term, we wanted to take this opportunity to remind you of:



- the signs and symptoms of measles
- the importance of the MMR vaccine
- what action to take if you have a suspected case within your setting.

#### What is measles and what are the symptoms?

Measles is a highly infectious viral illness and spreads very easily. It can cause serious complications such as blindness, pneumonia and meningitis and can be fatal. Young babies, people who have weakened immunity (are immunosuppressed) or pregnant are at higher risk of complications. Measles is a preventable disease; two doses of the measles mumps and rubella (MMR) vaccine provides full protection.

#### Measles symptoms to be aware of include:

- A non-itchy, blotchy red brown rash. This usually appears a few days after cold like symptoms (sometimes starts around the ears before spreading to the rest of the body). The rash can be harder to see on darker skin tones
- High temperature (fever)
- Cold like symptoms such as runny or blocked nose, coughing, sneezing
- Red, sore, watery eyes
- Small white spots appearing inside the cheeks and on the back of lips (for a few days)

Anyone who contracts measles is infectious for four days before any rash appears and for at least four days after the onset of the rash.

#### What to do with a suspected case of Measles

Children or staff or who have signs or symptoms of measles should be asked to not attend school, college or nursery as measles is highly infectious. They are advised to phone their GP practice or NHS 111 for advice.










On Friday 8th December Myton Hospice in Rugby held their annual 'Light up a Life' service.


