Dear Parents and Carers,

A rather belated Happy New Year to you all; I do hope that the year has got off to a positive start for you.

Returning to school this January, we have continued our focus on punctuality to school and I am pleased to inform you that we have seen a huge improvement since September. As you know, students who are late to school are expected to attend a 15-minute break detention and the majority do this assiduously. A small number of students either forget or make the choice not to attend, and, as of next week, we are changing our system slightly to encourage these young people to make the correct decision. From January 31<sup>st</sup>, the small number of students who fail to attend the 'late detention' at break will go into a same day after school detention for 30 minutes.

Enabling our students to have wider opportunities is a key objective for our school and we are fortunate to have been visited by the Navy today. They led a fantastic session in the catering area, running a 'Ready, Steady, Cook' competition. I know all the students involved had a great time and they certainly produced some fantastic food. We were also visited by Quantum Theatre Company this week who joined us to perform 'A Christmas Carol' for year 10. The students really enjoyed the performance and were impeccably behaved – in short, they were everything you would want an audience to be. This was a really important opportunity for the students as it supports their learning for the English Literature GCSE that they take later in the year.

I wrote to you recently regarding the very high level of Covid absences that we are seeing within the school at the moment, and I cannot let this opportunity pass without once again encouraging you to test your children weekly, on Sunday and Thursday, to try to ensure that they are not in



school whilst they have the virus. Despite the high number of student cases (over 200 since we returned three weeks ago), we have been fortunate that staff absence levels have remained manageable so far and I hope that, with regular testing in our school community, we can maintain a healthy workforce so that your children have their own teachers in front of them in the classroom.

### **NCS Programme**

Last week the National Citizen Service Team (NCS) held a virtual assembly with all Year 11 students to inform them about a fantastic opportunity available to them over the summer holidays. Today students are taking home a letter about the NCS summer opportunities.



The NCS programme offers young people, aged 16-17 (or age 15 and in Year 11), a once in a lifetime opportunity to do something meaningful during their summer break, as well as a chance to develop key skills for employment whilst taking on new

challenges that will set them up for adult life. They'll also do something good for their local community, carrying out a project to support a cause they care about. We've seen first-hand what an amazing feeling of accomplishment and increased confidence this brings. Throughout 2021, teenagers on NCS donated 500,000 hours of their time to help rebuild their communities following the pandemic, showing what a difference young people can make when they work together towards a goal.

#### What is involved in the NCS programme?

- Week 1 (Mon-Fri): BE EPIC & LIVE LIFE 4 night Residential (Location TBC).
- This week combines 2 phases of the programme. The BE EPIC phase involves team building activities and outdoor pursuits all aimed to get the young people out of their comfort zone and s mixing socially with new friends. The LIVE LIFE phase is all about developing independence and key skills for the future. Your teen will be able to network with local employers, engage with charities and organisations from across the West Midlands.
- Week 2 (Mon-Fri): DO GOOD Non-residential 9am-5pm (local venue to you).
- During the DO GOOD phase, the young people will team up with a local charity/organisation of their choice and undertake a rewarding project in their community. They will complete volunteering hours and utilise all the new skills they've acquired.

A place on NCS is worth up to  $\pounds$ 1200. The programme is government funded meaning the cost to take part in NCS is only  $\pounds$ 50.

If you receive additional financial benefits or your teenager receives pupil premium funding the cost of the programme can be reduced to £10!

#### <u>T Levels</u>

## **Science News**

#### Lego Club

Each week a group of 6 Year 7s and a couple of Year 8 students have been working on constructing their own Spike Lego models, following building instructions from the <u>Spike Lego Prime Kits</u>. Now complete, the students have begun using scratch programming to write commands that will make their models move and engage with obstacles.

It is Mr Mushing and the students' hope to attend the <u>National Lego League contest</u> and eventually compete in the Lego and Scratch Programming challenges.

#### Year 7 Science Club with Prefects

Over the last term, the Year 10 science prefects have been running, with the supervision of Mr Whitehead, a science club for Year 7 students. It has been a delight to see the joy and enthusiasm these students have for science and in particular the activities the Year 10 prefects have planned for them.

Students have so far taken part in;

- $\Rightarrow$  Building <u>Scribble Robots</u> little robots with pens attached to them that created doodle images when the motors are turned on.
- ⇒ <u>Oobleck</u> a non-newtonian fluid made from corn-starch and water. This fun substance acts like a liquid until force is applied to it, at this point it takes on the properties of a solid.
- ⇒ Tried out several different chemical reactions which created a very memorable experience for those in attendance, when the fire alarm was accidentally set off.
- ⇒ Finally over a period of two weeks the students also designed and created Rockets.

Over the next term, the Year 10 prefects will continue working with Year 7s to explore a variety of chemical reactions to see what happens and to continue inspiring a future generation of scientists.

With the summer examinations fast approaching, we wanted to make you aware of the multiple science after school support sessions that will be running this term.



#### <u>Tuesday</u>

Mrs Davis will be running a Year 9 and Year 10 GCSE Combined science support session until 4pm in Sc5. These sessions cover content taught during Year 9, in particular GCSE content that is covered, and encourages students to begin their science revision early on.

Mr Mushing will be running a Triple Science Chemistry revision support session until 4pm in SC1. These sessions tackle content taught throughout the entire Triple Science Chemistry course and therefore in particular targets supporting Year 11 students.

Mrs Spencer-Woodcock will be running a GCSE Combined science support session until 3:40 in SC2. These sessions will be particularly focused on Combined science basics for those completing the AQA Entry Level course.

#### <u>Thursday</u>

Mr Massey will be running a GCSE Combined science support session until 4pm in Sc4. These sessions tackle content taught throughout the entire GCSE Combined Science course and therefore in particular targets supporting Year 11 students.

Mrs Spencer-Woodcock will be running a Triple Science Chemistry revision support session until 4pm in Sc7. These sessions tackle content taught throughout the entire Triple Science Chemistry course and therefore in particular targets supporting Year 11 students.

#### <u>Friday</u>

Mr Goldthorp will be running a Triple Science Biology revision support session until 4pm in SC3. These sessions tackle content taught throughout the entire Triple Science Biology course and therefore in particular targets supporting Year 11 students.



There has never been a more important time to study geography. With the growing importance of issues such as; climate change, migration, environmental damage and inequalities, geography enables our students to explore and understand the ever changing world around them. We geographers pride ourselves in being able to critique and solve issues happening in the world around us, we do this in our geography lessons by 'thinking', 'speaking' and 'writing' like a geographer

Thinking like a geographer means breaking issues or concepts down into their necessary components. Speaking like a geographer means using subject specific terminology and vocabulary and Writing like a geographer encourages students to justify and explain opinions in a clear, balanced way. By following these three steps we are enabling students to achieve better and boost their confidence as global geographers!

This term year 7 students are studying the topic of settlement, this builds on the map skills learned last term and begins to develop their decision making skills, when they take on the role of Town Planner, having to decide where a new housing estate should be built. Year 7 students are also being encouraged to utilise their geographical mapping skills by partaking in our creative house competition 'Treasure Island'. Students can collect a sheet from their geography teacher, or



the social studies office, for the chance of winning a prize and some house points! Deadline is the 16th February, 2022.

Year 8 students have been trying their hand at making decisions regarding important current issues, such as deforestation of the rainforests and climate change! They have learnt about the background, causes, and impacts of these contemporary issues, before making critical decisions regarding the future of our planet.

Last term, students learnt about the power of our planet through the Natural Hazards unit, focusing upon volcanoes and earthquakes. They then practised their danger management



skills taking on the role of a Disaster Manager, this saw them making decisions about how to reduce risk to the people during a mock volcanic eruption. Well done to those who kept a level head and saved lives!

## **Geography News**

Year 9 Learning for Life lessons in geography have enabled students to understand how globalisation affects trade and evaluate the impacts of the global fashion industry. Students are currently considering the importance of the Middle East and its global influence. Year 9 GCSE students have begun to look at development; how it is defined,



measured and critiqued at both global and regional scales. Students have also been encouraged to explore and evaluate the strategies that help to reduce the global development gap.



Students in year 10 have just started their new topic about Bristol. This in-depth study builds on the knowledge gained last term which looked at the UK economy. This is a very interesting topic that looks at the post-industrial economy of the UK and encourages students to evaluate the strategies that are in place to address regional differences. The first set of end of topic assessments have shown that year

10 has hit the ground running and we want to congratulate those who are working incredibly hard, both within and outside of lessons.

As our year 11 geographers embark on their final topic, I would like to wish them the very best of luck as they move towards the final few challenges. ### Leave of absence

The Supreme Court recently reached a decision in the case of Platt v Isle of Wight Council which has clarified the law on unauthorised leave, including holidays, during term time. The parents of children of compulsory school age are required to ensure that they attend school on a regular basis. The Supreme Court has made clear that attending school 'regularly' means that the children must attend school on every day that they are required to do so. As such, the parents of any child who is absent from school without authorisation for any length of time are likely to be considered as committing an offence under s444 of the Education Act 1996.

Head Teachers retain the ability to authorise leave in accordance with the Education (Pupil Registration) (England) Regulations 2006. When considering such requests for a leave of absence, the school are obliged to act within the law. Head Teachers may not grant any leave of absence during term time unless there are exceptional circumstances relating to the application. If the leave is granted, head teachers are able to determine the number of school days a child can be absent for.

It is for the Head Teacher to decide what is 'exceptional' and it is at their discretion if the circumstances warrant the leave to be granted. The school can only consider Leave of Absence requests which are made by the 'resident' parent.

Each application for a leave of absence will be considered on a case by case basis and on its own merits.

Where applications for leave of absence are made in advance and refused, the child will be required to be in school on the dates set out in the application. If the child is absent during that period, it will be recorded as an unauthorised absence, which may result in legal action being taken against the parent(s), by way of a Fixed Penalty Notice.

Failure to make an application for leave in advance can also result in a Fixed Penalty Notice being issued to the parent(s).

All matters of unauthorised absence relating to a Leave of Absence will be referred to the Warwickshire Attendance Service, part of Warwickshire County Council

**It is important to note**, Fixed Penalty Notices are issued to <u>each parent of each absent</u> <u>child</u>, (for example 2 children and 2 parents, means <u>each</u> parent will receive 2 invoices in the amount of £120 each, totalling £240 for both children, this is reduced to £60 per child if paid within 21 days).

Where a Fixed Penalty Notice is not paid within the required timeframe as set out on the notice, the matter will be referred to Warwickshire County Council's Legal Services to consider instigating criminal proceedings under S444 Education Act 1996.

Fixed Penalty Notices are issued in accordance with Warwickshire County Council's Code of Conduct for Penalty Notices.

### **Register your bike**

Local neighbourhood police team visit school to protect bikes

A team from Rugby Police Station recently visited the school to add security markings to bikes belonging to the school's students.

The school was initially approached by Cllr Wayne Rabin, councillor for Newbold and Brownsover ward, who helped to organise the event in collaboration with the local police team and school. On the morning of the bike marking event around 30 students opted to protect their bike by having it security marked and added to the BikeRegister.

Registering on BikeRegister means an owner can be reunited with their bike in the event of it being stolen. The details of bikes registered are held on a secure online database which all UK
