### Careers News

#### **Coventry University Arts & Design taster day**

On 20th June, 13 Year 10 students successfully applied and were accepted to attend an Arts and Design day at Coventry University. Throughout the day the students were treated to two different activities, with the morning session focusing on how shapes can be combined to create structures. This session allowed students to consider how these structures can be sculpted, but also took on an architectural focus as there was a definite need to consider how the designs would remain functional. In the afternoon session, students were introduced to the basic skills needed to design visual elements of video games, creating characters for a science fiction concept. Students behaviour was impeccable and they were a credit to the school.





#### Rugby Art Gallery - Talk and tour visit

On Monday 10th July a group of year 9 students visited Rugby Art Gallery. They heard about the different pathways to working in an art gallery, before having a tour of the current exhibition. Jessica Hartshorne, a local illustrator then talked to students about her career journey and showed the students how she creates her artwork, as well as allowing students to create their own characters.













### Work Experience Week

What an amazing week for our year 10 students, 170 students had in-person Work Experience (WEX) placements, 16 had virtual WEX placements and 25 students took part in workplace visits. Students worked at health clubs, garages, doctors surgeries, a swim school, as well as in secondary & primary schools. They worked with gardeners, engineers, the Army, the police and the fire services. They undertook experiences in hospitality, at theatres & dance companies, in Environmental organisations, distribution companies, and transport companies, to name just a few.



Employers said that the students were amazing, fantastic, employable, humorous and good leaders. Some students were paid, won employee prize of the week or have now got a Saturday / summer job with the company.









As this academic year comes to a close, may I take this opportunity to thank the multiple employers, employees and post 16 destinations who have been a big part of the 2022-23 AVS careers programme. 
submissions and consistently positive attitude towards their science studies this academic year.



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
































































































































































### Leave of Absence

The Supreme Court recently reached a the application. If the child is absent during that term time. The parents of children of Penalty Notice. compulsory school age are required to ensure that they attend school on a regular basis. The Supreme Court has made clear that attending school 'regularly' means that the children must attend school on every day that they are required to do so. As such, the parents of any child who is absent from school without authorisation for any length of time are likely to be considered as committing an offence under It is important to note, Fixed Penalty s444 of the Education Act 1996.

Head Teachers retain the ability to authorise Registration) (England) Regulations 2006. When considering such requests for a leave of absence, the school are obliged to act within the law. Head Teachers may not grant any Where a Fixed Penalty Notice is not paid within leave of absence during term time unless there are exceptional circumstances relating to the application. If the leave is granted, head school days a child can be absent for.

It is for the Head Teacher to decide what is Fixed 'exceptional' and it is at their discretion if the circumstances warrant the leave to be granted. The school can only consider Leave of Absence requests which are made by the 'resident' parent.

Each application for a leave of absence will be considered on a case by case basis and on its own merits.

Where applications for leave of absence are made in advance and refused, the child will be required to be in school on the dates set out in

decision in the case of Platt v Isle of Wight period, it will be recorded as an unauthorised Council which has clarified the law on absence, which may result in legal action being unauthorised leave, including holidays, during taken against the parent(s), by way of a Fixed

> Failure to make an application for leave in advance can also result in a Fixed Penalty Notice being issued to the parent(s).

> All matters of unauthorised absence relating to a Leave of Absence will be referred to the Warwickshire Attendance Service, part of Warwickshire County Council

Notices are issued to each parent of each absent child, (for example 2 children and 2 leave in accordance with the Education (Pupil parents, means each parent will receive 2 invoices in the amount of £120 each, totalling £240 for both children, this is reduced to £60 per child if paid within 21 days).

the required timeframe as set out on the notice, the matter will be referred to Warwickshire County Council's Legal Services to consider teachers are able to determine the number of instigating criminal proceedings under S444 Education Act 1996.
