Message from the Head

Dear Parents and Carers.

I'm writing this month's newsletter piece whilst returning from The Belgrade Theatre Coventry, where I have had the pleasure of joining the Performing Arts department on a trip to see 'Blood Brothers'. The performance was excellent, as was the behaviour of our students - both on the coach and in the theatre. The visit was a valuable reminder of the significance of the performing arts within our school and the importance of school visits in widening the cultural capital of our students. A big thankyou to Miss Wheatley for organising the trip - her 30th to Blood Brothers! - which is often part of the GCSE specification.

This week I have also spent time with the students in the termly gold book assemblies. Although some students like to act a little blasé as they accept their achievement badge and certificate, it is clear that all of them are actually delighted, and they soon have the badges attached to their lapels.

Teachers and students are always tired by the end of term, and the arrival of Ofsted last week required staff and students to dig deep to show the school at its best for our visitors. At the end of the inspection, the lead inspector asked me to thank our students for their wonderful welcome to AVS and complimented them on their good manners and their positive response to the inspection team. The outcome of the inspection remains confidential until it is published a few weeks after the Easter Holiday and I look forward to sharing the report with you as soon as we receive it.

This time of year in Year 11 is a real pressure point for students as they struggle to reach controlled assessment deadlines, complete their practical exams in Art, and take part in their practice spoken language exams. With just 6 weeks before the exams start, students really need to put the hours in and it is vital that the students retain their focus and complete sound revision work over the Easter Holiday and return in April for the final four weeks of preparation before the exams begin. It feels that we have been informing them for ages that the exams are imminent – I hope that they all believe us now and are really getting on with the hard work needed to achieve their very best!

I would also like to remind parents/carers of students in year 10 that the English Literature

GCSE exams take place after Easter and it is important that, like the year 11 students, they invest time in preparing for this important exam, learning key quotes and revising the texts ready for assessment in May.

Thank-you as always for your support over the last term. I hope you have a Happy Easter and I look forward to returning for my final summer term on Monday April 17th.





Students Learn About Alternative Energy Year 9 students take part in engaging STEM workshop

Year 9 students recently took part in an engaging STEM day, which challenged them to work in teams to think about alternative energy.

The immersive 2 hour workshop, which was delivered by Energy Quest, was designed to unlock the students' inner engineer as they explored alternative energy sources. During the session the students got hands-on, as they learnt about practical engineering. In one of the activities the students used energy from an orange to power a lightbulb.

The Energy Quest workshop challenged the students to use engineering skills in order to solve a problem. The workshop took the students on a journey during which they engaged with the engineering design process, and had to think and act like engineers. In addition, the students had the opportunity to speak to an engineer and learn about the pathways into engineering, feeding into the school's careers programme.

Year 9 student, Lily, said: "It was extremely interesting and great fun! It inspired me and some of my friends to think about becoming an engineer".

Careers events so far this term:

National Apprenticeship week

- * Selected year 11 students visited the WCG Big Bus tour to find out about the benefits of apprenticeships.
- * All students have had access to activities about apprenticeships in their Career Google classroom.
- Year 10 students heard from WINVIC about the variety of jobs available in the construction industry.
- * All students had a presentation from Balfour Beatty Vinci about apprenticeship opportunities working on HS2.
- Students have watched videos about apprenticeships in curriculum subjects.

National careers week

- * Channel 4 delivered a virtual assembly about careers in the creative industry. We now know what a "grip" is.
- * Year 8 students had an assembly about university and year 9 students heard from WCG about the variety of courses available at college.
- * Year 11 students interested in sport heard from Nuneaton Performance Academy about their new sports offer.
- * The Royal Geographical Society and Oxford University outreach spoke to geography students about the possibilities to study the subject further.
- * STEM ambassador Kelvin spoke to students about Civil engineering as a career and Dr Tan delivered a talk about the importance of Maths in engineering.

Leave of Absence

term time. The parents of children of Penalty Notice. compulsory school age are required to ensure that they attend school on a regular basis. The Supreme Court has made clear that attending school 'regularly' means that the children must attend school on every day that they are required to do so. As such, the parents of any child who is absent from school without authorisation for any length of time are likely to be considered as committing an offence under It is important to note, Fixed Penalty s444 of the Education Act 1996.

Head Teachers retain the ability to authorise Registration) (England) Regulations 2006. When considering such requests for a leave of absence, the school are obliged to act within the law. Head Teachers may not grant any Where a Fixed Penalty Notice is not paid within leave of absence during term time unless there are exceptional circumstances relating to the application. If the leave is granted, head school days a child can be absent for.

It is for the Head Teacher to decide what is Fixed 'exceptional' and it is at their discretion if the circumstances warrant the leave to be granted. The school can only consider Leave of Absence requests which are made by the 'resident' parent.

Each application for a leave of absence will be considered on a case by case basis and on its own merits.

Where applications for leave of absence are made in advance and refused, the child will be required to be in school on the dates set out in

Supreme Court recently reached a the application. If the child is absent during that decision in the case of Platt v Isle of Wight period, it will be recorded as an unauthorised Council which has clarified the law on absence, which may result in legal action being unauthorised leave, including holidays, during taken against the parent(s), by way of a Fixed

> Failure to make an application for leave in advance can also result in a Fixed Penalty Notice being issued to the parent(s).

> All matters of unauthorised absence relating to a Leave of Absence will be referred to the Warwickshire Attendance Service, part of Warwickshire County Council

Notices are issued to each parent of each absent child, (for example 2 children and 2 leave in accordance with the Education (Pupil parents, means each parent will receive 2 invoices in the amount of £120 each, totalling £240 for both children, this is reduced to £60 per child if paid within 21 days).

the required timeframe as set out on the notice, the matter will be referred to Warwickshire County Council's Legal Services to consider teachers are able to determine the number of instigating criminal proceedings under S444 Education Act 1996.

UK Polar Network Flag Competition

Last term, 4 students in the KS3 Geography lunch club partook in the UK Polar Network's Flag Competition. They worked together to design a flag, which was sent off to Antarctica with a research crew who will send us a photo of it 'in the wild', with a certificate too!

Below is a report written by two of our geographers; Emma and Naomi.

'The Polar Network Flag Competition is a competition giving school kids the opportunity to design a flag for Antarctica. The theme of the flag is to demonstrate the importance of the Antarctic Treaty whereby 54 countries agreed that it will remain free from threat and invasion to preserve its ecological importance.

We chose the shape of Antarctica as the main focal point and inside chose to include some animals that live there. We included 54 stars to represent the 54 countries that signed the Antarctic treaty and agreed to protect it from invasion.

We really enjoyed this activity as it was very fun to complete and a very exciting thought that our flag will get sent to Antarctica! We would love to do something like it again!'

The key stage 3 geography club entered the UK Polar Network's Antarctica flag competition before Christmas. They learnt a little about Antarctica and why it is incredibly important that we protect it before designing their own flag. Once the flag was sent off, it was paired with a team of researchers who took it out to Antarctica and sent us a photo and a certificate back!

In the photos are Emily Rowlands, Angelika Slomska and Ryan Saunders the marine ecologists investigating the impact of plastic pollution upon the wildlife within the



Southern Ocean, surrounding Antarctica. They were focusing on Krill, which is a main food source for whales, seals and penguins and aimed to collect data to help us understand the influences of climate change, fishing pressure and predation on this important Antarctic animal.

I want to say a huge thank you to the UK Polar Network for facilitating this amazing opportunity. Over 300 schools applied to partake in this programme, and so it was a honour to be chosen!

Well done to the four year 8 students who worked toward this; Naomi, Beatrice, Emma and Harvey. I look forward to welcoming some more year 7 and 8 students to get involved again next year!
