Careers News



This month all students had the opportunity to find out more about apprenticeships. During National Apprenticeship Week students had the opportunity to take quizzes to find out how much they knew. They heard from an ex AVS student who is currently doing a degree apprenticeship with Jaguar Landrover and they found out what apprenticeships are available in the local area. I am adding current apprenticeships to the year 11 Google careers classroom as they go live.

February 7th was a Careers Splash day for year 7. Students worked on a task set by Fisher German; a company who specialise in property. Students demonstrated great teamwork, initiative, organization and problem solving while building a tower using only marshmallows

and spaghetti. Later in the day Helena and Rosie talked to students about their career pathway with the company. 95% of the students who took part agreed that the task helped them develop their employability skills and many students enjoyed the talk and asked questions; (mostly) about salaries! In addition, students researched jobs using an online careers



website called Career Pilot and watched some videos about companies local to Warwickshire.



Year 8 Splash day focused on opportunities for students to complete tasks that would help them to achieve their PIXL Edge award. Students used Careers Pilot to recognise their values and views that could lead to

them choosing certain jobs, identified influences on their career choices, heard from AVS alumni about option choices

and played career Top Trumps. 97% of students felt they benefited from hearing from AVS Alumni.

Year 9 worked with The Problem Solving company to develop their employability skills of communication, teamwork, using their initiative and year 11 took part in activities run by the Uni Connect from Warwick University.

AVS welcomes award winning speaker and Warwickshire Police

Students took part in a crime awareness day which focused on the consequences and impact of drugs, county lines, gangs and knife crime.

Once again, we welcomed Paul Hannaford, an award-winning drugs awareness speaker, whose life experiences bring an insight to the real consequences of drug addiction, knife crime, gangs and county lines. Paul delivered his talk to all students in year 9, year 10 and year 11 and spent time working with students in small group sessions.

Alongside Paul Hannaford the school also welcomed police officers and PCSOs from Rugby Police Station. The team, who form part of the local safer neighbourhood team, arrived early to set up a knife arch which is used as part of Operation Sceptre, a nationwide campaign aimed at tackling knife crime. As the students arrived at school they had the opportunity to see the arch in operation as they passed through the arch. The police staff remained on site all day running group talks during which students had opportunity to ask questions about crime, the law, and the role of the police.

The school's headteacher, Alison Davies said, "Our aim for the day was to raise awareness about the dangers and consequences of drug and substance abuse, as well as knife crime. Paul Hannaford, who has worked with us for a number of years, is an excellent speaker. The students always listen to what he has to say and are shocked by his life story; this goes a long way towards reinforcing the work already completed by the students in this area. We are also very grateful to the staff from Rugby Police Station for spending the day with us and for interacting positively with our students."

A Year 10 student has recently been awarded several certificates including a preliminary coaching award from The Football Association.

Football mad Ellie Angus who plays for Rugby Town Girls and Womens FC, and is participating in her clubs Young Leader programme, also regularly coaches younger age groups at the club and has achieved several FA certificates.

One of the certificates awarded to Ellie is The FA Playmaker Award which is a new entry-level football course for volunteers, aged 14+, in the grassroots game. Ellie successfully completed the course's five modules, which focus on the basics of football providing a toolkit and skills needed to get involved and help create a fun, safe and inclusive experience for those being coached.

In addition, Ellie has completed courses which have taught her how to deal with concussion and sudden cardiac arrest. In the future Ellie has her sights on a refereeing course and aims to complete her first coaching badge once she turns sixteen.

Alison Davies, Headteacher, said, "It is great to see that Ellie is getting involved in coaching at her football club. At school she's also involved in the Young Leaders programme and I know the skills she'll develop will help her in PE and sport studies lessons. I wish her all the best for the rest of the football season."

Leave of absence

The Supreme Court recently reached a decision in the case of Platt v Isle of Wight Council which has clarified the law on unauthorised leave, including holidays, during term time. The parents of children of compulsory school age are required to ensure that they attend school on a regular basis. The Supreme Court has made clear that attending school 'regularly' means that the children must attend school on every day that they are required to do so. As such, the parents of any child who is absent from school without authorisation for any length of time are likely to be considered as committing an offence under s444 of the Education Act 1996.

Head Teachers retain the ability to authorise leave in accordance with the Education (Pupil Registration) (England) Regulations 2006. When considering such requests for a leave of absence, the school are obliged to act within the law. Head Teachers may not grant any leave of absence during term time unless there are exceptional circumstances relating to the application. If the leave is granted, head teachers are able to determine the number of school days a child can be absent for.

It is for the Head Teacher to decide what is 'exceptional' and it is at their discretion if the circumstances warrant the leave to be granted. The school can only consider Leave of Absence requests which are made by the 'resident' parent.

Each application for a leave of absence will be considered on a case by case basis and on its own merits.

Where applications for leave of absence are made in advance and refused, the child will be required to be in school on the dates set out in the application. If the child is absent during that period, it will be recorded as an unauthorised absence, which may result in legal action being taken against the parent(s), by way of a Fixed Penalty Notice.

Failure to make an application for leave in advance can also result in a Fixed Penalty Notice being issued to the parent(s).

All matters of unauthorised absence relating to a Leave of Absence will be referred to the Warwickshire Attendance Service, part of Warwickshire County Council

It is important to note, Fixed Penalty Notices are issued to <u>each parent of each absent</u> <u>child</u>, (for example 2 children and 2 parents, means <u>each</u> parent will receive 2 invoices in the amount of £120 each, totalling £240 for both children, this is reduced to £60 per child if paid within 21 days).

Where a Fixed Penalty Notice is not paid within the required timeframe as set out on the notice, the matter will be referred to Warwickshire County Council's Legal Services to consider instigating criminal proceedings under S444 Education Act 1996.

Fixed Penalty Notices are issued in accordance with Warwickshire County Council's Code of Conduct for Penalty Notices.
